LUKE 18

a certain blind man

sat by the way side begging:

- ³⁶ And hearing the multitude pass by, he asked what it meant.
- ³⁷ And they told him, that Jesus of Nazareth passeth by.
- ³⁸ And he cried, saying, Jesus, *thou* Son of David, have mercy on me.
- ^{39a}And they which went before rebuked him, that he should hold his peace: but he cried so much the more,
- ^{39b} *Thou* Son of David,
- have mercy on me.
- ⁴⁰ And Jesus stood, and commanded him to be brought unto him: and

when he was come near, he asked him, ⁴¹ Saying, **What wilt thou that I** shall do unto thee? (Singular)
And he said, **Lord**, that I may receive my sight.

⁴² And Jesus said unto <u>him</u>, **Receive thy sight:**

thy faith hath saved thee.

⁴³ And immediately <u>he</u> received his sight, and followed him, glorifying God: & all the people, gave praise unto God.

If there is more than one witness to a disaster, different events are noticed by each and thus differing accounts are given. Similarly, the Holy Spirit led Matthew, Mark, & Luke to note divergent details of this healing by our Lord. Here, one reason is to test the reader's faith. Matthew mentions two blind men (20:30), and Luke seemingly placed the incident at Jesus' approach to Jericho instead of His exit (18:35). Now there clearly were two blind men. Both acknowledged Jesus as Messiah ("Thou son of David" & "Lord") and, although not mentioned in Scripture, also two Jericho's: the old lay in ruins and a new a mile away built by Herod the Great for his winter palace. Now it is clear from Matthew and Mark that the healing took place as Christ left Jericho. Indeed, the two beggars sat near the city exit. Thus, the healing miracle could have taken place as Christ was leaving one and entering the other. Yet, the more likely reason for the apparent error of omission in Luke was that, compared to the miraculous healing and the unwavering faith especially displayed by Bartimaeus, Dr. Luke simply did not consider the casting away of Bartimaeus' garment worthy of note (nor did Matthew, nor Mark the other beggar). Similarly, we offer that Dr. Luke also did not deem it essential to say where in the city the miracle occurred!
